Schools Plus -Bicentennial School Angel Tree

School and Bus Cancellation Communication Points

As part of the School and Bus Cancellation policy (approved 27 January (2010), principals are asked to remind their school communities regarding school cancellation procedures.

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<u>Parents should be reminded</u> that the policy refers to both weather cancellations and also emergency closures.

All schools belong to one Family. If any school is closed outside of the Family, the school's name will be announced separately. If you have additional questions, please contact your School Administration Supervisor.

Principals of elementary and junior high schools must have a communication network devised so that parents can be contacted if school is cancelled during the day.

It is recommended that elementary and junior high schools use their Safe Arrival Program or similar initiative to monitor students who have not arrived at school on inclement weather days in particular, as is their practice on any school day.

Principals should communicate with staff and parents regarding the educational value of various activities used with smaller groups of students when busses are cancelled. It is important that meaningful learning activities occur on this day.

Key Message Reminders to Parents:

The decision to cancel school will usually be made as close to 6:00 a.m. as possible and it will be communicated on the radio, the Board's website, the main switchboard and through the school cancellation number - 464- INFO (4636).

Parents must ensure that students are properly dressed for the weather conditions, regardless of whether they walk or travel by bus.

Before dropping students off at school on inclement weather days, parents should ensure that staff have arrived and are immediately available to provide supervision.

If busses are cancelled and schools are open, parents must use their own discretion with regard to sending their children to school.

When schools are open, meaningful learning activities will be going on in classrooms.
